

The Crossing is the oldest part of the Church and the tower and four massive pillars date back to 1210. The South and North Transepts were built at the same time.

Hanging in the centre of the crossing is a fine brass candelabrum donated in 1720 by the local Woolmer family. This is suspended from a circular plate carrying the Three Fishes emblem of Holy Trinity. This plate is removed whenever one of the church bells, located in the tower, above has to be removed for maintenance or repair.

A number of gilt covered 'Green Men' can be seen above your head. These pagan faces, with leaves instead of hair, were adopted by medieval churches to symbolise resurrection and renewal.
