## **WELCOME TO HOLY TRINITY**

The annual Shakespeare Service is an opportunity for us to give thanks, before God, for the wonderful contribution made by William Shakespeare of Stratford-upon-Avon to culture and the arts world-wide. This beautiful church building tells the story of Shakespeare's life, from his baptism to his death, and our celebrations this weekend take us on a journey from his birthplace in Henley Street to his grave here in Holy Trinity. This journey is symbolised by the quill, which left the Birthplace this morning, and will arrive into the church during this service, to be placed on his funeral monument.

We're delighted today to welcome our guest preacher, Alison Shell, who is Professor of English at University College London. She specialises in the study of Renaissance literature and her books include *Shakespeare and Religion*. 2024 marks the 400th anniversary of the death of Henry Wriothesley, 3rd Earl of Southampton, well-known as a literary patron and scholarly benefactor in Shakespeare's time, to whom Shakespeare dedicated his long poems Venus and Adonis and The Rape of Lucrece. Will be be reflecting today on how each of us might encourage others to use their God-given gifts.

In 2024 the Shakespeare Club is celebrating the 200th year of its founding and some current members are participating in this service. The early members took determined action which began the transformation of the town into a place of cultural pilgrimage, making it the internationally famous tourist destination that it is today. The Club is also credited with involving the townspeople themselves in the annual celebration of Shakespeare's birthday in the town of his birth.
