As wonderful as our worship was, what really struck me was what happened beyond the worship, elements possibly closer to the first Easter than any service. The time people spent together as a community. Cleaning the churches, in particular Holy Trinity after the scaffolding had been removed, decorating with flowers, rehearsing for Witnesses by Trinity Players and other services, working together at the Easter Fun Day at All Saints', Sharing in Prosecco after the Easter Eve service. Worship Notes May 2024

Sunday 12th May Annual Meeting of Parishioners and Annual Parochial Church Meeting. The sermon at the Parish Eucharist is the Vicar's Address and then afterwards in the Parish Centre we meet to elect our Church Wardens, new PCC members and other office holders. We also receive a report on the life of the parish in 2023. All are welcome to attend.

Sunday 19th May Pentecost. This is one of the most important festivals of the church year, when we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit and come to the end of the Easter Season. This year the 10am Parish Eucharist at Holy Trinity will also be the Civic Service, when we look forward to praying for God's blessing on our new Mayor and the Town Council Chaplain will preach. This is an important occasion when we have the privilege of placing the Christian faith at the heart of our town and pray for our local civic leaders.

Another special service on 19th May is our Churches Together Joint Service which is at 6pm at Stratford United Reformed Church. This will be followed by the AGM for Churches Together in Stratford. Please note there will not be a 5pm service at Holy Trinity that evening as we would like to encourage everyone to attend the joint service.

Another important day in the church year is **Thursday 9th May, Ascension Day**. There will be the traditional early morning Eucharist at 7am at Holy Trinity, concluding with the blessing given from the roof of the North Porch. Followed by breakfast in the Parish Centre, and all finished in time for work and school!

At **5pm on Saturday 11th May** all are welcome to join us for the special service of Choral Evensong to celebrate the 40th Anniversary of the Friends of the Music.

To finish the month, Sunday 26th May, Trinity Sunday, is the Patronal Festival for Holy Trinity when we give thanks for the dedication of our beautiful church as "The Collegiate Church of the Holy and Undivided Trinity". This day is also a significant one for our Associate Priest, the Rev. Kay Dyer, as it will mark her final Sunday in this role before she retires and joins the ranks of our Honorary Assistant Clergy. It will be an opportunity to give thanks and express our gratitude for Kay's fruitful ministry in this parish over the years.





Wednesday, 26 March, 2024

With an overfull audience somewhat cramped in the Chancel, the actors of the Trinity Players presented Witnesses, devised and directed by Ursula Russell, the story of Holy Week, from Palm Sunday to Easter Day. It took the form of a sequence of dramatic monologues (with the occasional dialogue) given by the witnesses to the events. The voices were those of, essentially, ordinary people registering in amazement the culmination of ministry of Jesus Christ, the Messiah, hardly ordinary events.

Not all the voices were ordinary, but the more ordinary, the more extraordinary what they witnessed appeared to be. Those who were not ordinary had their dignity to protect – a rationalist doctor who could explain everything, Caiaphas the High Priest with the honour of his office to protect, Pontius Pilate who has his difficult job amongst the obstreperous natives whom he needed to pacify.

Officialdom needs to protect its authority. Meanwhile, the Son of God was observed by the apostles, adrift in the turbulence of the events, women from the crowds who opened themselves to the amazement of what was unfolding before them, culminating in Mary of Magdala who is there at the tomb amazed in the presence of her risen Lord. Interleaved amongst this chronicle of scenes were meditative music and poems, adding emotional resonances to the events presented, with hymns to begin and end the presentation, drawing in the audience, or congregation, or spectators to the Passion of our Lord, a story we all knew well but which was brought here vividly and personally to life.

The Trinity Players are an accomplished troupe, each of whom in this performance Inhabited their characters with clarity and commitment. There was little distance between audience and performers in the Chancel, giving an intimacy to the production that made it perfect for the place it occupied in the Holy Trinity Holy Week services. Although, in essence a drama, it was also a service, a celebration of The Passion as each Eucharist also is.



PCC REPORT from March

Worship Teams - the PCC was taken through the planning stages of the 10am Parish Eucharist at Holy Trinity, the liturgy, the music etc. over the preceding months. There are currently four teams set up in 2021 but it is probable that this will be reduced to three, each with its own leader. They are looking to recruit new members.

Annual Accounts - these have been signed of by the auditors ready for presentation to APCM.

Annual Elections - three new Church Wardens are due to be elected, one Deanery Synod representative and seven PCC members. Applicants need to have been on the electoral register for six months and only those registered may vote.

The quotation for the new heating in the Church and Parish Centre was agreed.

The memorial bench for Rohan Stewart McDonald is ready and will be installed near the entrance to the North Transept.

A new Display case is being funded by FOSC to correctly and securely display items of interest and value.

Quotations were accepted for repair and remedial work to the property at St John's Close which will be for the new Associate Minister.

A new hire agreement has been drawn up for parties hiring church facilities.

A Human Resources officer will be elected to assist with Parish duties as a volunteer.

The Job Description for the new Associate Minister for Outreach and Nurture has been finalised and interviews will be held early in May. The interview panel was agreed.

The next meeting is 21 May 2024.



'QUICK-EYED LOVE'

Journeying through Lent, 2024, with George Herbert A Lent Course presented in Holy Trinity Church By the Reverend RICHARD COOKE

George Herbert, intellectual, academic, orator and ultimately a parish priest in Bemerton, Wiltshire, wrote some of the most personal and intense Christian poetry in English, none of which was even offered for publication in his lifetime. He died a month short of his fortieth birthday in 1633, less than a decade before England was torn open by the Civil War. In spite of the upheavals of his age, Herbert's poetry is intensely personal, struggling with his faith and with what his faith meant for him. You don't need to be a Christian to appreciate the beauty and energy of Herbert's verse, but faith will give a sympathy to what he expresses, and this is what our Lent course articulated.

Richard Cooke, over five weeks in Lent, took us through a selection of Herbert's verse, opening up its meanings and implications as living engagements with a Christian faith. He began with Love (III), a favourite poem of many, in which Love, perhaps a personification of Christ himself, invites a, shamefully reluctant believer to the feast of faith. In the second week we considered The Collar, in which the poet struggles to free himself from the cage and rope of his belief but, in the end, cannot help but respond its simple call. Then, in the third week, we considered Herbert's ecstatic meditation upon Prayer - the church's banquet . . something understood,.

In the fourth week, we considered the poem that most of us know as a hymn: Teach me my God and King, exploring how faith lights up even the meanest of life's obligations. Then came The Call, a call to have faith light and guide life in love and joy, and also, in that fifth and final week, we considered The Agony, Herbert's meditation on Sin and Love, those matters that are beyond the reach of philosophers, but which are realised in Christ's Passion, Sin in the Agony of Gethsemane, and Love in the surrender of the Cross. Richard concluded his teaching on Herbert's poems with the sermon he gave in the Festal Choral Evensong on Easter Day, in which Herbert's poem Easter Wings, was considered, the larks harmoniously rising in celebration of the Resurrection, the spiritual triumph of spring.

Herbert's poems are complex, ambiguous, challenging, but, as with all the greatest poetry, they grip the reader by the imagination. In these sessions, the poems were read and discussed, from personal and theological standpoints. Richard Cooke is a highly accomplished teacher as well as and active and direct Christian. He encouraged our personal input, listening and responding carefully. These were wonderful active sessions, giving a real focus to our contemplation of the season of Lent.

FAMILIES ACROSS EASTER



It was a busy time over Holy Week and Easter for the work with Children and Families. The end of term was marked by having a whole school Eucharist at Holy Trinity School. As well as regular acts of Collective Worship (assemblies in older terms) during each term we have a Eucharist, for Harvest, Easter and School Leavers at the end of the academic year.

It's great to see the children taking part in the service, especially when they follow the actions of the person presiding, helping them

feel part of the Eucharistic Prayer.

At the Forest Church Service we thought about the different parts of the Easter story. As we told the story, we found items to make up our own Easter Gardens, making our own crosses from sticks we found. We finished by adding cress seeds to our gardens ready for new life to be brought to them over Easter. In May the services are on the 8th and 15th May starting at 4:15pm. We meet at the foyer of the Methodist Church before continuing the service in Holy Trinity Churchyard, anyone of any age is welcome.

After the Palm Sunday procession, the next of our Breakout Groups took place during the 10am Palm Sunday Parish Eucharist. This is a group for primary aged children to have some age-appropriate teaching. After watching a video retelling the events of Holy Week, they made their own palm crosses to hang on the Lenten tree they've been making.

During May we have two Breakout Groups, on the 12th and 19th of May.

On Good Friday the Journey to the Cross Service was an opportunity to pray through the events of Holy Week, with a selection of prayer stations around the church.



The service begins with the dramatic throwing nails into a tin bin, the noise echoes around the Chancel, and is quite emotional. We finish by looking ahead and

dancing around the cross, it's a very special service which appeals to people of any age.



On Easter Day the children did a great job helping with the sprinkling of water from the font, making sure everyone was aware of their baptismal promises.

At the end of the service, it was great to see people of all ages taking part in the Easter Egg hunt, helping one another to find eggs.

Last year we began the Bible Gift Fund, to help pay for Bibles to be given to the Year 6 Leavers at Holy Trinity School and for those Christened. We gave out 58 Bibles to the Year 6 and 35 at Christenings across the Parish. This was all because of the generosity of members of our congregations. We will soon be approaching the end of term and buying Bibles for this year's school leavers. 



Window on the World

"Politics" is often a dirty word. It seems to be simply about the nasty manipulations of power in our national and local lives. Many would prefer to have nothing to do with it.

Yet that word is derived from the Greek word polis – the city, the community, the nation. And in ancient Athens, for example, "politics" would have been a good word, all about our responsibilities as citizens. The prophet Jeremiah, some 2500 years ago, wrote these words to his fellow-Jews in exile in Babylon: "Work for the good o the country [or polis] to which God has exiled you.... for in its welfare you will find your welfare" (Jeremiah 29:9). We, and perhaps older people especially, may sometimes feel today like "exiles" in our country, even possibly in our Church – this was not what we were brought up in! But it is where God has put us.

This will be a very "political" month. Local elections on 3rd May could not only determine the power structure in our local communities themselves, but point the way to a General Election later in the year. And in our church, too, we have our annual meeting on 12 May which will enable us to address any "political" issues here, including not only the election of our Churchwardens and PCC members, but also of those who will represent us at higher levels in the Church – for our Deanery Synod members in turn elect those at Diocesan and General Synods Politics is about power, and power involves reconciling people's diverse views –which means that it is all too often about conflict. We may be able to keep conflict to a minimum in a local church (it might be exciting and even healthy to have the occasional contested election, but often differences can be settled in other ways). At higher levels – even in the Church of England, which does have its zones of sharp conflict at present, let alone in our deeply divided nation – we need to act "politically" if conflict is to be resolved for the welfare of all.

That means, amongst other things, responsible voting, again keeping in mind the welfare of all as Jeremiah argued - which may be different from our own personal advantages or preferences, so we must try to be as well-informed as possible, and not just vote according to habit or short-term interest. It may sometimes mean other sorts of responsible activism as well if, as all too often happens, the normal political processes appear unable to solve crucial issues such as climate change or child poverty. But, however we are involved, we cannot opt out. We are citizens of God's Kingdom, but also of a range of communities from the local church to the nation. As Paul Edmondson reminded us in his Good Friday sermon, we live "on the borderlines" between all these "kingdoms" and must take our responsibility in each.

So, let's exercise our democratic privileges to work for the good of all the communities to which we belong – not least because, in their welfare, we will find our own true welfare.

Praise the Lord! We are a musical church.

This slight misquotation from Under Milk Wood (a play recently re-read by Trinity Players) seems apt for Holy Trinity, especially when looking back at March. Music is so central to the ethos of the church, not least in our liturgy and this is very much the case at Easter.

I am always amused when people say to me that the choir must be busiest at Christmas since, although there are a lot of services much of the music is the same at each. This is not the case at Easter where each service starting the Triduum from Maundy Thursday has a very different character and the music similarly changes to reflect this. There is a certain amount of stamina required for the two services on the Thursday, with Compline at a quarter to midnight, the Good Friday service, after which the choir had a practice in readiness for the Easter Eve service, Holy Communion on Easter Day and finishing with Choral Evensong – 6 services in all and a time commitment of about 14 hours.

Earlier in the month the Soundbites lunchtime concerts, organised by the Friends of the Music, had been pulling in audiences of over a hundred despite taking place in the Parish Centre. These concerts and the sandwich lunch have become a regular appointment for many people and they present an amazing opportunity to enjoy a wide range of musical styles, as exemplified by the final two of the month. In the first of these, Peter Whitehead, a viola player from the Royal Birmingham Conservatoire performed an arrangement of the Bach Cello Suite No. 4, a wonderful but perhaps esoteric piece. The following week, local cellist Tori Rushton played a selection of Irish jigs and folk tunes incorporating electronic backing.

These concerts had been displaced to the hall primarily because of the organ restoration and two days after the scaffolding was down, that area was fully occupied by the 90-strong Stratford Choral Society. This has the distinction of being the oldest choral society in the UK and has strong links with Holy Trinity as its first conductor back in 1836, Thomas Helmore, was a member of the church choir and also conducted it for a time. Incidentally he was also responsible for the tune we sing to *O Come*, *O Come*, *Emmanuel*. The strong links between the society and the church have always remained and there are many of our choir and congregation who are or have been members. For this concert, the central piece was Mozart's *Requiem*. Its popularity was evident in the strong ticket sales, resulting in every pew and stacking chair in use for a packed audience. It was also the first occasion for the newly restored part of the organ to be heard, augmenting the richness of the orchestra.

Thus in the course of the month, very many notes were played or sung. I think this reflects well on us as a church whether the music is heard in a liturgical or concert setting. Perhaps what is most encouraging is that this month was not a one-off, as every month music plays an important part. This will be celebrated in May when we have the first choir reunion day, bringing back about 50 former choristers, at least one of whom was in the
